## BUSINESS IN THE CREEK

### Spartan Gourmet Coffee Arrives in Harborcreek



If you're driving Route 5 and see the lights on at Nostrovia Brewing Company at 6 a.m., there's a good reason why: Spartan Gourmet Cafe has come to the 'Creek. This family-owned small business has paired with Nostrovia, as their host, to bring freshly-roasted gourmet coffee to town.

The Thompson family of Fairview first opened their roastery in June of 2020. Kyle Thompson will tell you that roasting is not a simple process. It's complex, requires precise equipment, and includes a lot of science. Roasting involves no assembly lines or factory equipment.

However, it's not so simple as throwing a bucket of green coffee beans into a big machine, letting them swirl around for a bit, then dumping the roasted coffee out. There are hundreds of chemical reactions that take place within the 10 or 15 minutes it takes to roast a batch of coffee, and controlling these can be quite difficult. Small changes in temperature, humidity, airflow, and time can make dramatic changes to the final cup, so roasters have to be very precise with their roasting routine and environment. Coffee roasters are craftsmen who want to do right by their customers and the coffee.

Nostrovia offered to host Spartan Gourmet Cafe in March of this year. You can grab a cup of house coffee for only a few dollars, and espressos, lattes, cold brews, pour over coffees, teas, and much more can be found on the menu. Coming in to the cafe not just for a cup of coffee, you can also grab a bag of ground or whole bean coffee to go, muffins, doughnuts and light fare, and gift cards are for sale. If you visit the website you are able to order online, purchase digital gift cards and even blend your own coffee.

## Old Man Winter Will Eventually Return

We certainly don't want to rush the winter weather in but here are a few tips regarding Harborcreek Township Winter/Snow removal operations.

While snowplow drivers never intend to damage lawns located within the township right of way- when a driver is operating a vehicle that weighs in excess of 20 ton, there is the possibility that the wing of the plow may encroach into your lawn – which, please remember, is still in the right of way. To assist the drivers, you may want to install a few flexible plow markers in your yard. Also remember that the purpose of snow plowing is to remove snow from the roadway. Drivers do not intentionally “plow in” driveways. In addition, please see the Mailbox Installation regulations so that plow wings can remove snow effectively.

A reminder that parking along Township Roads or in the adjacent right of way is prohibited between October 15 and April 15 of each year for the purpose of snow and ice clearing by township personnel. We ask for your compliance with Ordinance 39-1966-1.

## Winter Weather Outlook – Harborcreek Roads Crews Are Ready

No matter what the experts are predicting, rest assured that your Harborcreek Township Roads Crews are ready for whatever Mother Nature deals us.

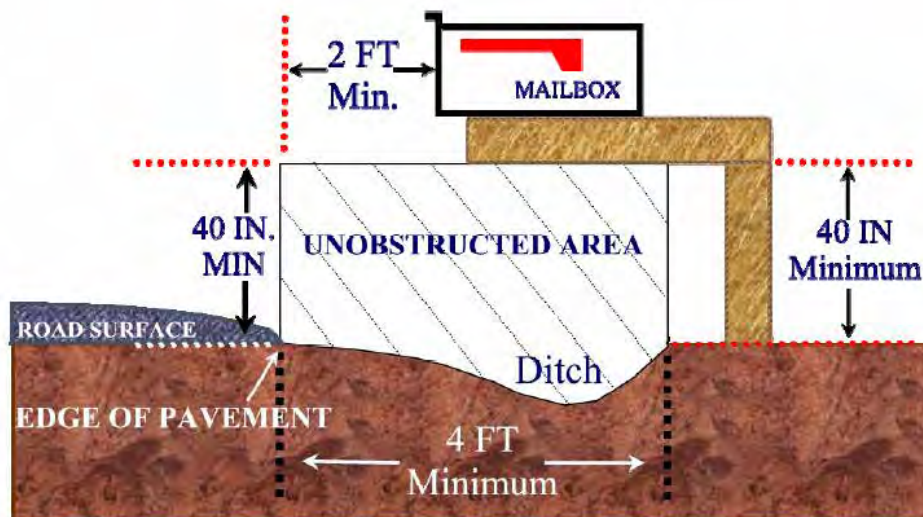
Many prediction models are showing near normal to warmer than average temperatures in the Great Lakes area and a decent chance that precipitation could be slightly above normal.

With snowplows ready, salt and antiskid in stock and an experienced group of drivers ready – Harborcreek Township residents can feel confident that crews will keep an eye out 24/7 to make your drive as safe as possible.

### Mailbox regulations in accordance with the diagram below:

1. The support post should not be placed in the drainage ditch. If the berm is too narrow, the post should be placed on the backside of the drainage ditch.
2. Support arms longer than 4 feet should have angle supports which do not extend into unobstructed area which allow for snowplows.
3. The newspaper box should be attached to the support arm. This box should also not extend into the unobstructed area for snowplows.

**Harborcreek Township will not repair and will not be responsible for any damage to mailboxes which are not installed to these specifications.**

#### Home Collection Program for Household Generated Special Materials

As part of the residential solid waste and recycling contract with Waste Management, you have a convenient opportunity to dispose of your household generated special materials- safely, easily and responsibly. The At Your Door Special Collection<sup>SM</sup> program, a residential service offered by Waste Management, continues to provide year-round collections for you.

#### HOW DOES IT WORK?

##### 1. To Participate, you must set up a collection appointment.

There are three ways to schedule a collection:

The Call Center Representatives will guide you through the steps toward a safe and successful collection. You will be asked several questions, including your address and the type and amount of materials available for the pick up. You will be provided a convenient collection date and information about where to place the kit for collection. A kit will be sent to your home in plenty of time for you to gather and pack your materials.

##### 2. Preparing for collection

The collection kit includes an instruction sheet and other items to help pack and secure your household generated special materials. Please read the instruction sheet included in the kit.

##### 3. Material is collected

On the scheduled date, the service technician will collect materials directly from your home. They will sort and pack the materials for proper transportation, recycling and disposal. Participants will receive a postage-paid survey card to complete and mail back to help track the program.

##### 4. You have more material than will fit into the Kit?

Remember, this service is available year-round. Just schedule another collection! Small quantities may be combined with your neighbors. **Managing Household Hazardous Waste:** The best method of managing Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) is to prevent its generation in the first place. This involves selecting the least toxic item "to do the job" and buying only the minimum amounts necessary. Buying in large quantities is not a bargain if half of it has to be discarded. In the future, please consider buying environmentally friendly products.

##### Did You Know?

Latex paint is not a hazardous waste. It can often be donated to community groups and other organizations for re-use. Please consider this option before disposal.

Used motor oil is not hazardous, but may pollute our groundwater, waterways and soil if not properly managed. Many automotive station, auto parts and supply stores will accept used motor oil for recycling.

Automotive batteries may be exchanged at the place of purchase. Many battery retailers offer recycling even if you are not purchasing a new battery. In some cases, there may be a charge. Some scrap yards will also purchase lead acid batteries.

## A Few Winter Considerations

With winter weather fast approaching we want you to be aware of a few tips that can keep you and your family safe this winter season.

First off, driving in the winter means changing the way you drive. Snow, sleet and ice can lead to hazardous road conditions. Drivers should take precautions to ensure they will arrive safely at their destination. By doing a few things like checking the weather before you go out, making sure that your car is prepared for winter and knowing the best practices for avoiding accidents you should have little trouble driving in the winter weather.

Another thing that most people don't consider is the danger in shoveling snow. Shoveling snow is a major winter activity in our area and taking a few precautions can help you prevent unnecessary pain and suffering. Many doctors believe that picking up a shovel and moving hundreds of pounds of snow, after doing nothing physical for several months can be a big strain on your heart. Do not pick up a shovel without a doctor's permission if you have a history of heart disease. Doctors offer a few recommendations before and as you shovel, like taking it slow and

stretching before you shovel, push the snow rather than lifting it and do not work to the point of exhaustion. If you feel tightness in the chest or dizziness, stop immediately. Remember, a clear driveway is not worth your life.

And finally we address the silent killer, Carbon Monoxide poisoning. Carbon Monoxide detectors save lives, but less than one-third of homes in America have one installed. With December and January at the peak of CO poisonings please remember these following tips: Replace the battery for your home's CO detector each spring and fall, do not heat your home with a gas range or oven and never run a car or truck inside an attached garage. And if your CO detector does happen to sound do not try and find the source. Immediately move outside to fresh air, call the gas company or 911 and do not enter the structure until someone of authority has given you permission.

By following all or some of these recommendations you and your family can enjoy this winter season safely while counting down the days to summer of 2022.

## Leisure Time Changes with Age

Strolling in the park with a four-legged friend, participating in a yoga class or training for a 5K: everyone uses their free time differently. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, on an average day,

nearly everyone aged 15 and over (96 percent) engages in some sort of leisure activity.

Socializing and communicating, such as visiting with friends or attending or hosting social events, accounted for an average of 39 minutes per day. And no surprise, people spent about twice as much time socializing on weekend days (58 minutes) as on weekdays (31 minutes).

The study found time spent on leisure peaks at age 15 to 19 years (5.60 hours) and then trails off until age 65. People age 35 to 44 only enjoy 3.95 hours per day, but then it steadily increases to 4.55 hours (45 to 54 year olds) and 5.42 hours (55 to 64 year olds).

Employed adults living in households with no children under age 18 engaged in leisure and sports activities for 4.5 hours per day, 1.2 hours more than employed adults living with a child under age 6.

## Continuous Improvement Working Together!

If you have driven past Whitford Park or have been to Six-Mile Creek Park in the last few months, you may have noticed some changes. The Harborcreek Township Parks Commission has been working with some of our residents to improve our parks, and what you are seeing are the results of that teamwork.

Back in early 2020 the Park Commission identified Whitford Park sport courts were in need of an update. Noting the current tennis surface was in need of repair it was decided to look into converting the surface from tennis to a new exciting sport, Pickleball. Jim Perrotto and members of the Erie Pickleball Players Association Inc., (EPPA) came in to help and advise. With EPPA advice, it was decided to resurface the sport courts. Shortly after end of summer Harborcreek's talented road crew applied a new asphalt surface. This new surface needs to age and come this spring new sealer and acrylic colored pickleball and basketball courts will be ready for play!

In early 2021, the Northern Allegheny Mountain Bike Association (NAMBA) presented a multi-use trail proposal for Six Mile Creek Park that was ultimately approved to allow for mountain bike enthusiast to safely share the park with hikers and horseback riders.

The Harborcreek Parks Commission is made up of an administrative member, Parks Supervisor and Parks Coordinator along with an Advisory Board. As an advisory board to the township supervisors, the Parks Commission is looking for more great ways to continuously improve

our parks for the community. We are always open to new ideas for consideration and implementation. Have an idea for parks improvement? Here are some of the steps that helped EPPA and NAMBA get their ideas into action and implemented.

**Have a plan** – As a board, we want to understand what your goal looks like, and it's also important to know what steps need taken to get there. The more clearly you can articulate the plan, the easier it is for the Parks Commission to understand it and communicate it to township leadership.

**Show an example** – Success stories matter. Provide examples where a similar idea to yours has been implemented and share testimonials about how that positively impacted the community. Is your idea completely original and never been done before? That's okay too, just understand that it will take longer to vet through the process.

**Have the resources** – Harborcreek Township does an amazing job managing its resources. Additional burdens, whether financial or physical, must be moderate in nature. Any resources you can provide, whether its in the form of labor, grants, sponsorship, etc, will help the chances of approval.

**Be patient** – There is always a process to approvals – between allowing the board to consider it and having back-and-forth discussion, having lawyers review the proposal, allowing the community to provide feedback, to ultimately having the Township Supervisors vote on it – remaining patient (and positive) is critical to the success of your idea.

**Demonstrate the community's enthusiasm** – when EPPA and NAMBA showed up to the Parks Commission meeting to present their idea, they ensured there were a lot of supports in the crowd. This demonstrated that this was more than a single person's desire, but a really a call to action from the community.

**Be open to feedback** – The parks are for every resident of Harborcreek and as a board, we try to ensure we protect the parks for everyone's usage.

While following this guidance doesn't guarantee approval, it certainly helps. If you are interested in attending a Parks Commission meeting, they are held on the third Monday of every month at 6:00 pm in the township building.

## New Pickleball Courts at Whitford Park

Pickleball is the fastest growing sport for aged 55 and older adults in the U.S. It is played by ages 8 to 80 by boys and girls and adults alike. Now, thanks to Supervisor Steve Oler, Dave Eaglen, Supervisor Tim May, Owen McCormick, and Jim Perrotto, two new pickleball courts will be installed at Whitford Park in Harborcreek in the spring of 2022. A new basketball court will be included in the renovation.

Pickleball began in 1965 by Congressman Joe Pritchard and friend Bill Bell. The property at their homes in Banbridge Island, WA had an old badminton court and net but no equipment. Instead they had paddleball paddles and a wiffle ball. The men created rules and began to play. Now, 66 years later, pickleball is a multi-billion dollar business that is played by millions of people. The name pickleball came from the name of the family dog, Pickles, and by the shape of the paddles that are used today.

Six years ago Jim Perrotto, Randy Lightner, Rosella Kwitowski, and Karen Pascale started playing one day a week at the Eastside YMCA. Today

there are 150 pickleball players and the game goes six days a week at the facility.

When Covid hit, the YMCA closed. Jim Perrotto asked Tim May if lines could be placed on the tennis courts at Whitford Park so that the game could be continued to be played in a safe outdoor environment. This was done and the game went on.

This past year the Harborcreek Parks and Recreation Board lead by Steve Oler and Dave Eaglen got involved and helped to raise money to pave the courts at Whitford Park. Owen McCormick donated the paving materials, and Harborcreek Township did the paving. The new courts will be installed by spring of 2022.

The Erie Pickleball Players Association will provide free lessons to beginners, would like to start some leagues in the afternoons and evenings. This is a fun game and all ages are welcome.

# HEALTHY AROUND HARBORCREEK

## Rein in Nighttime Charley Horse

At some point, most people have become well-acquainted with the gripping pain in their calf that can launch them out of a sound sleep.

Yep—the dreaded charley horse. These excruciating muscle contractions can take hold of any muscle, day or night, but frequently affect the thighs, calves and feet. Since 60% are of the middle-of-the-night variety, those are the ones addressed here.

There are a handful of common beliefs about the origins of the charley horse; however, the causes are not entirely understood. Two popular speculative reasons are dehydration and low levels of electrolytes, like magnesium and potassium. Current thinking suggests these painful contractions are triggered by muscle fatigue and involuntary firing of the nerves that stimulate the affected muscle.

Although straining and overusing the muscles can leave them vulnerable to a charley horse, so too, can being sedentary or failing to stretch prior to exercise. Other risk factors are prolonged periods of sitting or standing, pregnancy, aging and poor circulation. Additionally, specific medications can make you prone to them. These include diuretics (water pills) as well as medicines used to treat high cholesterol, high blood pressure, asthma, osteoporosis and nerve pain.



When it comes to preventing a nighttime charley horse, pay attention to these areas.

**Sleep position.** Any time your toes are pointing downward for prolonged periods, your calves are tightening. That means sleeping on your back, especially with heavy covers weighing down on your feet, sets you up for them. To relieve this pressure, roll up a blanket and place it beneath the covers by your feet to “tent” them. Sleeping on your stomach with your toes lying flat against the bed should be avoided too. Remedy this by placing a folded blanket beneath your shins.

**Stretching.** Loosen up tight leg muscles during the day and before turning in. Stretching exercises, massage or foam rolling all work.

**Moving.** Keep your blood circulating by getting up and moving frequently throughout the day. Avoid remaining in the same position for hours on end. Conversely, exercising to the point of over-exertion isn't recommended either. There's a fine balance here.

Once you're in the throes of a charley horse, try to flex your toes up toward your head. For a greater stretch, wrap a towel or necktie around the ball of your foot and pull it towards you. If you suffer from frequent bouts, be sure to keep these items next to your bed. If the cramping isn't relieved or it's in your foot, thigh or shin, get up and walk around. Bearing weight often helps the muscle to release. Massage and applying heat facilitates relaxation of the muscle too.

There are countless over-the-counter products on the market geared toward halting a charley horse. The only way to know if they will work for you is to experiment with them. Also, keep in mind that there are underlying medical conditions, such as impaired circulation to the extremities, which can result in leg cramps. If they become frequent, severe or are accompanied by other changes in your health, be sure to bring it to the attention of your health care provider.

# HARBORCREEK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

## Penn State Behrend Sees Changes to Historical Buildings

Penn State Behrend recently said a fond farewell to Erie Hall which is being replaced by a new complex. Planning for Erie Hall began within a year of the opening of the campus in 1948. All of the standing buildings from Glenhill Farm were in use and space was at a premium. Physical education classes were taking place outdoors and in off-site locations and there was a need for more office space. The Behrend Advisory Board envisioned a recreational space for their students and for the wider community and in the early years local schools, including Wesleyville, used the space for dances and commencement. Edwin Nick oversaw the campaign, and the first donor was Mary Behrend, who pledged \$1000. Because the money was raised locally, the decision was made to name the building Erie Hall. Besides sports, offices, and academic work, Erie Hall was also the scene of a popular campus event, Duffy's Tavern, which was a talent show. The building saw several renovations over the years, including the construction of some walls in the basement by Behrend engineering students, but it no longer fits the needs of the campus.

The Federal House, meanwhile, is getting a facelift and an addition. Thomas Rees built the house, which he sold to Thomas Bonnell in 1838. For half a century it was passed down through several generations of the Bonnell family until the estate of Richard Bonnell sold it in 1891 to John Van Scoter (Vanscoter), the first of a series of short-term owners. Van Scoter, who had made a fortune in petroleum, continued to live in his home on Erie's Millionaire's Row and hired Frank and Appolonia Geil to live there and farm the land for him. Van Scoter was the widower of Helen Morrison Van Scoter, whose sister Ella lived down the street with her husband Charles Reed in what is now the Erie Club.

Widow Dora Schultz purchased the property in 1894. It was convenient to her teaching post at Gospel Hill School. She was quite active in the community serving as President of Ladies' Relief Corps, Secretary and Chaplain of the Union Patriot Club, and was a member of the Utopian Social Circle of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. On January 4, 1897, moments after she was installed as president of the local Woman's Relief Corps (the women's auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic), a messenger interrupted her remarks to tell her that her home was on fire. The second story and roof sustained major damage.

Mrs. Schultz sold the home in 1908 to Jay and Effie Lathrop who farmed it until 1912, when it was purchased by Reverend Ira Sartwell of Wayne Baptist Church and his wife, Ida. They occupied the home until 1919 when it became the homestead for two generations of the Miller (Mueller) family. Edward Miller worked as a blacksmith for the New York Central Railroad for 58 years, while his wife, Rose, was a housewife. Their daughter Mildred and her husband, Edward Klinger, raised her family there and sold the property in 1967 to Floyd Smith, owner of Automation Devices, who donated it to Behrend in 1988. The Smith Chapel is named in his honor.

The home is said to have been a stop on the Underground Railroad. Richard Bonnell's wife, Sarah, was the sister of Frank Henry, a well-known participant in the cause, though she and Richard were not living in the home when the Railroad was active.

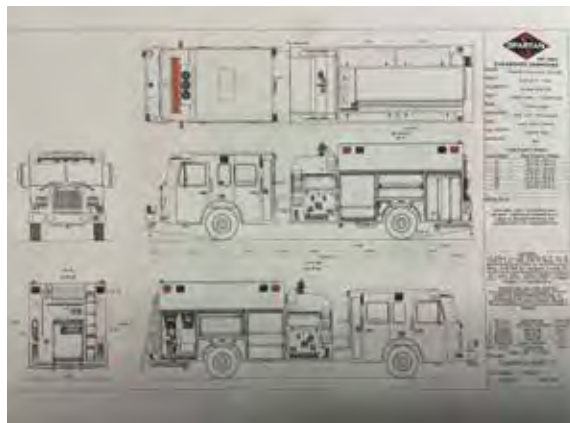
Our members work hourly, Weekly, Monthly, Yearly to train to be better EMS / Firefighters.
